Speaker ?: Yeah.

Speaker ?: Isn't like Sonic.

Speaker 1: It wasn't In-and-Out, it wasn't Sonic, it wasn't McDonald's.

Speaker ?: Burger King, Wendy's.

Speaker 1: Wendy's.

Speaker ?: Wendy's again.

Speaker 1: Yeah, Wendy's had the 1st modern drive through window.

Speaker 6: 1970.

Speaker 1: It's 1970 Yeah. Pretty recent, Pretty recent.

Speaker ?: We didn't have a drive through until then?

Speaker ?: I'm amazed.

Speaker ?: What did we do before then?

Speaker 6: What about soccer practice? [13:02 overlapping conversation]

Speaker ?: Like I used to be able to walk into Arby's and they would shave the meat.

Speaker 1: Oh yeah, right. so who could forget having grown up in the eighty's and the ninety's, the tiny Chihuahua that [13:19 inaudible] Taco Bell. What was that actual name of that dog?

Speaker ?: There was a name?

Speaker 1: It had a name.

Speaker ?: Who knew.

Speaker 1: No, partial credit.

Speaker ?: Appetizer.

Speaker 6: White Castle.

Speaker 1: White Castle is what it says here. His favourite is White Castle.

Speaker ?: There's some similarities there, they both slide.

Speaker ?: Oh [laughter]

Speaker ?: My brother is a fan of the chicken rings. Oh okay.

Speaker ?: Has anybody here tried the Asian corn beef on the corner over there on the... [crosstalk]

Speaker ?: Is it good.

Speaker ?: Yeah, it's decent, it's not bad. It's corn beef.

Speaker 1: Kendra says she's the greatest fast food eater that you know?

Speaker 5: Something like that.

Speaker 1: But between you and Dave, like I mean we've got everything covered basically. Dave is a pretty big fanatic.

Speaker ?: I'm a foodie. So I mean I'll admit it.

Speaker 6: Really?

Speaker ?: Yeah, I love food. I grew up in that culture besides I've got the name to prove it, so...

Speaker 3: Yeah, it's true.

Speaker 6: I just thought that you might have been eating like higher quality food.

Speaker 1: I do that too every now and then.

Speaker 6: Yeah I stepped up to Outback or something every once in a while.

Speaker ?: Outback!!! Did you say step up to outback? That's awesome.

Speaker 1: Did you do the thing where you just pull up and they throw it in your car and you driveway?

Speaker ?: No. [19:40 overlapping conversation]

Speaker ?: You've got to go for the whole thing.

Speaker ?: You know why do you think they like to look at the boomerangs you know and all the picture on the wall and stuff.

Speaker 1: Exactluy, you've got a good stake.

Speaker ?: Lambchops.

Speaker 1: Oh lambchops... There you go.

Speaker ?: Not the [19:53 inaudible] lambchop, right.

Speaker 1: Ok perhaps one more to go here and basically were running on like a 4.0... through the last one in finals week, who cares you know. What American fast food chain is called Hungry Jack in Australia?

Speaker ?: So what do they call their instant mashed potatoes?

Speaker 1: Good question. Dave says what do they call their instant mashed potatoes? [laughter]

Hungry Jack's already taken, I can't let this chance to go by since I got my graduate degree in urban

Illinois just south of us is Charleston Illinois, where there was a single mom and pop style think Hunter house white castle style restaurant called "the Burger King."
