Male Speaker: Any other hilarious commentary on that interesting question?

Male Speaker: Maybe it's going to take us a long time to get home again.

Male Speaker: Yeah. Well, that's also true.

Male Speaker: "Will the ship be made of the same parts that it left with?" that's what I

say.

Male Speaker: And will Penelope still be faithful and unraveling her sewing?

Male Speaker: Oh.

Male Speaker: Geography, Earth writing. "What is the diameter of the earth measured in

miles?"

Male Speaker: 7300 and something.

Male Speaker: The diameter or the radius?

Male Speaker: 8000.

Male Speaker: It says the diameter is what it says here. So, it's a little bit closer to 8000,

but it's more than the 7000.

Male Speaker: Okay.

Male Speaker: Yeah, that's correct. Let's see here, "What river runs through the city of

Baghdad?"

Male Speaker: Tigris, Euphrates.

Male Speaker: it's the Tigris.

Male Speaker: Tigris, okay.

Male Speaker: Yeah, absolutely. Tigris, not Tigress. Got to keep that in mind too. "What country on planet Earth has the most natural lakes?" This is a good one

too. I mean, look at the...

Male Speaker: My homeland?

Male Speaker: I would say the US.

Male Speaker: Canada?

Male Speaker: It's not the US, it's Canada actually. Yeah.

Male Speaker: Nice.

Male Speaker: I was going to give Dave the googly eyes.

Male Speaker: No, no, no, no, no.

Male Speaker: "You know, Canada."

Male Speaker: I'm thinking, "Okay, north of Minnesota. Yeah, it's us."

Male Speaker: Mm-hmm, it's definitely, definitely Canada. "Which African nation contains the most pyramids?" It just seems like a very general kind of question, but there's an answer.

Male Speaker: Okay, wait a minute here.

Male Speaker: It's not Egypt.

Male Speaker: Sudan.

Male Speaker: It's the Sudan. Yeah, that's what it says here. Now, how do you know that off the top of your, Jason?

Male Speaker: They just posted an ad for travel to Sudan and I'm like, "Who on earth would travel there?" Then I see these pyramids, I'm like, "Oh."

Male Speaker: "Oh, that actually looks pretty."

Male Speaker: Oh Yeah.

Male Speaker: "Could run up the side."

Male Speaker: I think you need a little more temptation than some pyramids to go

there.

Male Speaker: Yeah, exactly. Like...

Male Speaker: No offense to the wonderful Sudanese people listed today.

Male Speaker: Yeah.

Male Speaker: Stretch your dollar far by touring sedan.

Male Speaker: Yeah, I mean, is there like an Anthony Bourdain segment that they can

run or something like that?

Male Speaker: Travel insurance.

Male Speaker: Yeah. "What is the tallest mountain in North America?"

Male Speaker: McKinley?

Male Speaker: Right, but we don't call it that anymore.

Male Speaker: Denali.

Male Speaker: Denali is what we call it, using the native tongue. Yes.

Male Speaker: I'm still in denial about that change.

Male Speaker: Very nice.

Male Speaker: Yeah.

Male Speaker: Very nice.

Male Speaker: And if you get multiple denials, we can call them Denali.

Male Speaker: Exactly.

Male Speaker: That's awesome.

Male Speaker: It really is beautiful when you get to see it.

Male Speaker: No question.

Male Speaker: I remember driving up from... from Anchorage one time and I came around the bend and then, all of a sudden, out there in front of me, you know, was Denali. And the clouds had parted sort of briefly, because usually, the top of it's covered with clouds. It was amazing.

Male Speaker: The closest that I've ever come to anything like that is I think I got a good look at it from a plane, but it still is actually pretty unbelievable. When you drive over the Continental Divide, it's like, "Whoa, that's actually on the planet Earth." "Which continent by volume," we want this response, "has the most freshwater?" Here's a hint, it's not North America.

Male Speaker: Antarctica.

Male Speaker: It's Antarctica because it's all frozen. Yeah, that's exactly it.

Male Speaker: Well, I don't know how much longer that is.

Male Speaker: I know.

Male Speaker: Better make your drinks with the ice now.

Male Speaker: I will modify the question, "Which continent used to have the most freshwater?"

Male Speaker: Remember this will end up being a classic episode eventually. So...

Male Speaker: Oh, yeah, true, true. "It's an Ask The Professor flashback when we had fresh water."

Male Speaker: "When we had fresh water in Antarctica."

Male Speaker: You know, we got a wonderful set of questions that I'm not going to read quite yet, sent to us by Kimberly rich. But she wanted to remind us or ask us the single question of, "Who invented the idea of having a leap year?"

Male Speaker: Julius Caesar.

Male Speaker: It was Caesar actually, yeah. I highly doubt Caesar sat at his desk and figured it all out, but worked with the scientists or astronomers of the day and noticed... I just think this is funny. After a couple of years, it seemed the calendar had slipped out of sync with the seasons. So, it's just sort of like maybe snowing in summer and go. "Hmm, something is out of whack."

Male Speaker: So, the Julian calendar had a leap year?

Male Speaker: Well, it says here, they came up with a 365-day calendar that would sometimes add an extra day to the last month, which was at that time, February. The purpose of adding the extra day is to sync up the... with the Gregorian calendar, Gregorian with the solar calendar, which FYI, let's see if anybody can remember is 365 days, how many hours? 5 extra hours. How many extra minutes?

Male Speaker: 48.

Male Speaker: 48 minutes.

Male Speaker: Holy moly.

Male Speaker: How many seconds?

Male Speaker: 12?

Male Speaker: 46 seconds.

Male Speaker: It was off.

Male Speaker: Yeah, I'll take the 48.

Male Speaker: Yes, the near exact amount of time it takes the earth to revolve around the sun. And to correct for near exactness, century ending years must be divisible by 400 to be a leap year. So, while 2000 was leap, 1700, 1800, 1900 were not. The next such double zero leap year will not be until the year 2400. I know 2200 looks like it should be, but check the math, it won't. I'm sort of surprised by the look on your face, Dan, because I want to say that many, many years ago...

Male Speaker: What?

Male Speaker: ... we were talking about leap year, and there actually is the need for a leap second every once in a while to make sure that everything totally syncs up with the 24-hour day. And, yeah, it's kind of cool. I recently saw a proposal that we should add February 29th, not as February 29th, as an extra day between June 30th and July 1st that would be a day without a date. And everybody would get the day off in the entire world

and we'd just sort of celebrate the earth. I was like, "I don't know, that seems just crazy enough that it would kind of work." I'd like something like that.

Male Speaker: Where would people spend their money if everybody has the day off?

Male Speaker: Right, exactly.

Male Speaker: What would the receipts say if they spent money on that day? That's...

the day without a date.

Male Speaker: And then what if you got married on that day?

Male Speaker: Oh, hey, we...

Male Speaker: Are we in one of the States where...?

Male Speaker: What if you were born on that day?

Male Speaker: I know.

Male Speaker: Ooh.

Male Speaker: Well, one of my students was born on February the 29th.

Male Speaker: I was going to say, are we in one of the States where they force you to

choose February 28th or March 1st as your birth date?

Male Speaker: Wow.

Male Speaker: There are States that do that. Yeah.

Male Speaker: Oh, okay. Because I remember we always say, "Oh, you're 4 years old

again," or whatever, you know?

Male Speaker: That was very Pirates of Penzance of you.

Male Speaker: Yeah.

Male Speaker: Yeah, exactly. My favorite is to open up the Farmer's Almanac and see like the 17 different calendars that human beings use and which one has the biggest

year.

Male Speaker: I can't we just use Stonehenge and be done with. It's so much easier.

Male Speaker: Get the Farmer's Almanac Get it right about winter some year.

Male Speaker: We could use the Mayan calendar, but it ran out in 2013.

Male Speaker: It's true, it's true.

Male Speaker: We have another set of questions here, "Dear profs, once again, your podcast kept me entertained on my drive from Detroit to the dear old UP. Hearing you all riff about Casablanca and bogey, I was inspired to come up with movie questions. Some of these films go all the way back to The Day, and some are more recent. They run the gamut from Kish to Cult to mainstream and everyone has a name of a city in its title. I'm giving you the plot you guess the title, 9 out of 12 is passing (high standards). It's good old Maryland Batura Communising in the very, very cold UP." Yes.

Male Speaker: Beautiful in the summer though.

Male Speaker: Absolutely gorgeous. For the 48 hours of summer that Munison gets, if you can predict when it will be, yes. Farmer's Almanac says sizzling drizzle for this spring in summer. So, it should be very interesting.

Male Speaker: Irrespectively, right?

Male Speaker: Yes.

Male Speaker: Oh.

Male Speaker: Mm-hmm. Debra Winger was in it.

Male Speaker: An Officer and a Gentlemen.

Male Speaker: No, that's not got a city in it either.

Male Speaker: Last clue is Joe Mantegna.

Male Speaker: Joe Mantegna?

Male Speaker: Yes, he's one of my favorite actors.

Male Speaker: Fat Tony.

Male Speaker: Fat Tony. Yes, that's right. Any ideas here?

Male Speaker: No.

Male Speaker: Well, what does it mean... what does it mean when you don't remember

something, we say that you...?

Male Speaker: Forget?

Male Speaker: Forget, and now city title.

Male Speaker: Forget Paris.

Male Speaker: Forget Paris is what it's called. That's full credit, full credit.

Male Speaker: With a clue.

Male Speaker: I didn't recognize that.

Male Speaker: Credit with a clue.

Male Speaker: That's alright.

Male Speaker: Spelled with a K, like kram, something like that.

Male Speaker: Does anybody remember 1995? I'm not even sure that I do.

Male Speaker: I do.

Male Speaker: Yeah.

Male Speaker: I think so, yeah.

Male Speaker: Vaguely.

Male Speaker: I think that's what I paid in taxes last year.

Male Speaker: Oh, okay, very nice. Well, you're going to be getting more back this

year...

Male Speaker: Right, no, I'm not.

Male Speaker: ... thanks to it being a election here. "The owner of a South American hotel can't get a music license for his grand opening, so may lose everything. The band he hired solves the problem by putting on a musical airshow, including dancing girls on the wings of low flying airplanes." I love. 1933.

Male Speaker: Just going to guess Rio, something about Blame it on Rio?

Male Speaker: Oh yes, it is. It's something... not Blame it on Rio.

Male Speaker: Flying over Rio.

Male Speaker: I'm giving it to you, Flying down to Rio.

Male Speaker: Flying down to Rio, yeah.

Male Speaker: Yeah, you hit it. That's beautiful, Jean Raman, Dolores Del Rio.

Male Speaker: Dolores Del Rio.

Male Speaker: And Fred Astaire, of course, yes. The all-time classic.

Male Speaker: So, dancing girls on wings of planes?

Male Speaker: Yes.

Male Speaker: Why not?

Male Speaker: I've never seen it.

Male Speaker: And the posters had that, had the biplanes, you know, with the dancing girls on the wings.

Male Speaker: It wasn't until about a couple decades ago that my wife finally sat me down and forced me to watch White Christmas. And now, I'm fascinated by the number of movies of that era that are, we got to save the blank, put on an awesome show that raises a lot of money. Male Speaker: Yeah, that was a great movie. I liked that.

Male Speaker: It was pretty good.

Male Speaker: "During World War II, a submarine sneaks into Japanese harbor and places a team of spies on shore so they can provide information for bombing raids."

Male Speaker: Tokyo Drift.

Male Speaker: Destination Tokyo?

Male Speaker: Destination Tokyo, 1943.

Male Speaker: I kept on picturing 1941, but that wasn't it.

Male Speaker: Cary Grant, John Garfield, Alan Hale is what we have here. Wow,

that's...

Male Speaker: Alan Hayle?

Male Speaker: Senior.

Male Speaker: ... extremely topical for 1943.

Male Speaker: Gilligan's Island?

Male Speaker: Oh, no, Senior. Alan Hayle Jr. is the one in Gilligan's Island.

Male Speaker: Oh.

Male Speaker: Yes.

Male Speaker: I did not know that.

Male Speaker: I didn't know that.

Male Speaker: The father was thinner.

Male Speaker: "Law professor, John Bottomly, who leads a task force to apprehend the killer who is terrorizing women. There are 13 victims before the murder is apprehended.

1968."

Male Speaker: The Boston Strangler?

Male Speaker: Yes, the Boston Strangler. Tony Curtis and Henry Fonda. Yeah, that's right. Very well done, very well done. John Bottomly though, I don't know, it sounds a bit of a joke.

Male Speaker: Mm-hmm, somebody lost a bet.

Male Speaker: Yeah, somebody lost a bet. "Annie here's a man on the radio talk about his missing wife and becomes obsessed with him to the point of breaking her own engagement."

Male Speaker: The aforementioned sleeper.

Male Speaker: Sleepless in Seattle.

Male Speaker: Sleepless in Seattle, yes. 1993, Meg Ryan, Tom Hanks, and of course, Rosie O'Donnell. "Carol become suspicious of her neighbor when he seems too happy after his wife suddenly dies. But she can't convince her husband anything's wrong. She ends up investigating and eventually, they get in over their heads because it turns out she was right."

Male Speaker: No, it's got a city.

Male Speaker: But it sounds like kind of...

Male Speaker: Like a Rear Window.

Male Speaker: You're thinking a Rear Window-ish kind of thing.

Male Speaker: Oh yeah, Rear Window, sorry. Yeah, there's a window thing.

Male Speaker: FYI, this is 1993, it's a Woody Allen and Diane...

Male Speaker: Manhattan?

Male Speaker: ... Keaton special. Yes, it's Manhattan. What?

Male Speaker: Oh.

Male Speaker: 3 M's in this title.

Male Speaker: Oh, Manhattan Murder Mystery.

Male Speaker: Yes, I remember the poster had this huge tenement on it.

Male Speaker: Yeah.

Male Speaker: That's right. That's exactly right. And it did have a little bit of a rear window vibe, but this is a Woody Allen movie.

Male Speaker: Yeah, but wasn't there like a bunch of other stories in there too? I vaguely remember it. It was... you know, there's like...

Male Speaker: Like interwoven?

Male Speaker: Yeah.

Male Speaker: Okay. I can't remember it. It's forever. I was young and petulant.

Male Speaker: Not paying attention.

Male Speaker: What? I was awake. I think I was on a date. Allright, Dr. Seuss. "Reuben comes from a family of macho hunters, but has never bagged a buck of his own. When the opportunity arises, we wonder if you will pull that trigger."

Male Speaker: Bambi?

Male Speaker: Yes.

Male Speaker: 2001 is recent if you're not one of my students.

Male Speaker: Oh, well, yeah.

Male Speaker: You get the deer in the headlights like...

Male Speaker: Yeah, well mind you, they weren't born yet.

Male Speaker: Exactly.

Male Speaker: That's an issue, that's an issue. Harvey Presno and the giveaway is 2001, Jeff Daniels.

Male Speaker: What, Escanaba?

Male Speaker: Yes, Escanaba in the Moonlight. Yes.

Male Speaker: Wow.

Male Speaker: Memphis Belle.

Male Speaker: The flying fortress.

Male Speaker: Yeah, exactly.

Male Speaker: Which was true... true, it really was an airplane...

Male Speaker: Oh, okay.

Male Speaker: ... miraculously did not get shot down.

Male Speaker: Interesting. 25 tours.

Male Speaker: Yeah.

Male Speaker: That's... that's a lot. That's a lot. "To bring some publicity and revenue to their small town, an amateur hockey team accepts a challenge to play the New York Rangers on national TV." Dave, this category...

Male Speaker: It's a Russell Crowe movie, I remember that.

Male Speaker: Yes, it is, 1999.

Male Speaker: Yeah.

Male Speaker: Oh, crud.

Male Speaker: Mary McCormack, Russell Crowe, Hank Azaria. It's a horrible movie.

Male Speaker: No, I thought it was good.

Male Speaker: No, I thought it was horrible. Like, the odds of them beating the

Rangers.

Male Speaker: Anaheim Mighty Ducks.

Male Speaker: No.

Male Speaker: It's the name of the city where it takes place is the name of the movie,

and it's in Alaska.

Male Speaker: Yes.

Male Speaker: Not Juneau.

Male Speaker: Nope, no, no.

Male Speaker: I just...

Male Speaker: Until you guys think of it, I guess the name of the city will be...
