But if the pictures from Oregon in white look like fairly affluent neighborhoods with wide streets, there was just nothing, there were not timbers standing in these homes they were just wiped out.

Where are the half a million people going Beth.

Ah, well, either two parts of the state that are unaffected which I assume would be in the eastern part of the state, although Medford, which is in Southern Oregon I know the community right next to it has been devastated and I think Medford was hit pretty hard. I assume they're going east.

Okay, okay.

I mean we're used to, you know, Ash being all over everything right, what happened when St Helens blew right used to the this half inch of crud that was, was run everywhere but not things just being utterly destroyed.

Yeah, who doesn't like a good coating of crud, on a cool fall day.

No seriously though I mean there is a weather pattern, that's coming where we get affected by, you know fires as well there is more chance, there's more chance of fog where we live when it comes to things like that the weather pattern comes across the state of Michigan from west to east.
