Matt Mio 0:53

Dave Chow 0:57

Yes, we are.

Matt Mio 0:58

Yeah

Dave Chow 0:58

We're back to fighting form.

Matt Mio 1:00

Excellent.

Dave Chow 1:00

Although my voice sounds a little crackly. So if I sound as though I'm going through puberty, please forgive me.

Matt Mio 1:04

It's okay. We will forgive you. You should only have to do that once in your life after all, let's be serious.

Dave Chow 1:10

I'm trying to get it right.

Matt Mio 1:10

(Laughs) Speaking of doing it over and over again - like 1927. Just back from his tour of who knows what? Wait, I do. Arizona and Hawaii and a million other principalities. It's Professor Jim Tubbs.

Yes. Mostly that.

Dave Chow 2:55

We can go whenever.

Matt Mio 2:56

As soon as possible. What else is on the "as-soon-as-possible" list? I'm kind of intrigued. Is it like all travel?

Matt Mio 3:35

New Zealand sounds like it's Middle Earth after all.

Mara Livezey 3:38

It is Middle Earth.

Dave Chow 3:40

I will admit I have seriously looked there for employment.

Mara Livezey 3:44

Ooh.

Matt Mio 3:44

Listen to you

Dave Chow 3:45

Hey, the New Zealand Film Board. I mean, there's only so many storyboard people around New Zealand, right?

Mara Livezey 3:49

That's right.

Matt Mio 3:50

Gosh, well, we are very much favored today because we have Detroit Mercy alum, Bob Rogowski visiting with us. We're so glad to have you here with us today, Bob.

Bob Rogowski 3:59

Thank you. It's pleasure to be here.

Matt Mio 4:01

Yes. And speaking of traveling, I mean, you and your family are pretty well traveled. We're friends on Facebook, and it seems like every other day, you have some fantastic thing going on.

Oh, how comic!

Mara Livezey 5:01

Oh. It's so funny. Ha-ha.

Bob Rogowski 5:01

And Sweeney Todd. So we're gonna see at least four plays, go to a few jazz clubs and maybe squeeze in a matinee, too. So

That will be fantastic.

Bob Rogowski 5:14

Yeah.

Dave Chow 5:14

New York is one of those cities, you can have so much fun and get in so much trouble.

Matt Mio 5:17

Yeah, absolutely

Bob Rogowski 5:18

And there's a good number of alum that are, you know, doing different things career wise in the city. And so they do like little lectures and things for the students. And they really give them some practical advice about how to make a living in New York City or some other environments. So it's a great experience for the students. Yeah.

That's so great,

Bob Rogowski 6:10

I'm retired now.

Matt Mio 6:11

Yeah, thanks for doing that.

Dave Chow 6:13

Retired? You sound busier than ever

Matt Mio 6:15

I know, and he's a walking advertisement now, so that's also good. Yeah, we've got to wear our colors here too. What year?

Matt Mio 8:08

Yeah, what a year is my follow up question. What year was the air conditioner invented? Good old fashioned American ingenuity.

Dave Chow 8:15

Well, we used to call it open the window

1902.

Matt Mio 8:17

Uh - gosh -

Mara Livezey 8:18

I was gonna say like 1908, 1909, 1910

Dave Chow 8:19

1904

Matt Mio 8:22

I gotta give it to both of you. 1907. We split the difference there. 1907. Willis Carrier invented what we now call the modern air conditioner. Yes, recirculated air. Isn't that wonderful? Kevin Moen was born in 1961. That's a pretty big hint and it's not yet left us. The general area is athletics. Kevin did something very important on November 20 1982. It's a very important date in the history of modern American sports.

Matt Mio 9:05

I'm thinking of Moen faucets.

Dave Chow 9:07

But did he do something with like a football helmet or like Lacrosse.

Matt Mio 9:11

Football is going in the right direction.

Dave Chow 9:14

A kicking tea.

Matt Mio 9:15

I guarantee at some level all of us in the room have seen a very famous piece of footage having to do with athletics from November 20, 1982

Dave Chow 9:22

He invented the athletic supporter.

Matt Mio 9:24

No.

Dave Chow 9:24

Oh

Mara Livezey 9:25

Was he an athlete?

Matt Mio 9:26

He was an athlete.

Mara Livezey 9:27

Okay. Okay, So HE did something.

Matt Mio 9:27

Yep. This is a good one. This is a good one

Dave Chow 9:31

Moen. I'm trying to remember.

Matt Mio 9:33

Does the name ring a bell? That's the question.

Mara Livezey 9:36

Did he invent like one of those silly flops that you do when you like jump -

Dave Chow 9:40

The Fosbury Flop?

Mara Livezey 9:41

Yeah. like a technique to do. Did he invent a technique

Matt Mio 9:44

No inventing here.

Dave Chow 9:46

Oh, no inventing.

Matt Mio 9:46

Just general athletics. So I'll give, uh - just a - It said minimal clues from Professor Mio. I hope you know that that means maximum clues.

Okay. Yeah, we're in for that.

So the very, very famous football game on that date was between CAL and Stanford. Now they hate each other's guts.

Mara Livezey 11:17

Is it professor - Is itt Livezey?

Dave Chow 11:19

No, no, no,

Matt Mio 11:19

No, but it's close.

Dave Chow 11:20

Dog-gone it. I should know it. Not Jonas Grumby. What is it? Dog-gone it.

Matt Mio 11:26

Jonas Grumby, that rings a bell, too.

Dave Chow 11:27

That was the Skipper

Matt Mio 11:28

The Skipper. Yeah

Dave Chow 11:29

Uh, he was Roy something

Matt Mio 11:32

He was Roy something. Yeah. See, Dave knows -

Dave Chow 11:32

Oh, crud!

Matt Mio 11:37

The first initial was H

James Tubbs 11:39

Hinkley

Matt Mio 11:40

Hinckley, Roy Hinkley. Yes, the role of the professor

Dave Chow 11:45

Couldn't develop a coconut-based glue to save their lives.

Matt Mio 11:47

Yeah.

Mara Livezey 11:48

Wow.

Matt Mio 11:48

Oh, well,

James Tubbs 11:49

But somehow managed to invent radios and all kinds of stuff.

Dave Chow 11:52

Everything else.

James Tubbs 11:53

Chandeliers, evening clothes for everybody.

Matt Mio 11:57

Exactly.

Dave Chow 11:58

And wasn't there also like a car or a tricycle that Gilligan would ferry the Howells around in?

Matt Mio 12:08

That show. Okay. How about Edward Smith, lived from 1850 to 1912. Hint, hint. Was a British military officer. I'm definitely looking in a decidedly Jim Tubbs direction.

James Tubbs 12:20

Well, Edward J. Smith was the captain of the Titanic

Matt Mio 12:23

That is who it was. Died in 1912, as far as we know.

James Tubbs 12:28

Yes. That was his first and last voyage. The Titanic

Matt Mio 12:32

Yes, it was.

James Tubbs 12:33

He had come over from the Olympic.

Matt Mio 12:34

I'm still stuck on Titanique or whatever

Dave Chow 12:34

Yeah.

Bob Rogowski 12:39

It's some sort of Celine Dion parity rolled into the sinking of the Titanic

Matt Mio 12:44

Has enough time passed that it's okay to - you know -

Bob Rogowski 12:47

In some local trivia, Tiger Stadium, the old Tiger Stadium opened up like the same day or the same week as -

Matt Mio 12:47

That's right. As the Titanic sinking. Okay, how about Melinda Lou Thomas Morse. She was born in 1961. She's still alive. Essentially, she's a pop culture icon.

Bob Rogowski 13:08

What was the name again?

James Tubbs 13:09

She's not an influencer, is she?

Matt Mio 13:12

No. Well, I mean, no, but gee, this one's hard. Melinda-Lu Thomas-Morse, hyphenated surname there, Thomas-Morse.

Dave Chow 13:22

Is it in entertainment?

Mara Livezey 13:24

Does she has a different name she goes by? or no?

Matt Mio 13:27

Possibly, but it's not too far from the name that she has been given. It didn't say entertainment. It said pop culture icon.

Dave Chow 13:34

Mara Livezey 14:23

Yeah.

Dave Chow 14:33

Yeah, seriously.

Matt Mio 14:34

Like, if you go at it and go "I'm going to McDonald's tonight". It will say "What's your problem? It'll like message you back.

Dave Chow 14:39

Oh, it will terrorize you.

Matt Mio 14:40

Tries to terrorize you. Yeah, but not in a bad way. In a friendly burger. square-shaped burger kind of way, you know? Okay. Oh, this one's a little bit of a giveaway for my generation. We'll see. Matt Mio 15:23

James Tubbs 15:25

'55 to what? '82?,

Matt Mio 15:26

You know, it said '84 here so it was -

Bob Rogowski 15:28

I stopped watching him in 64. That's why I guessed that.

Dave Chow 15:31

As soon as you got a color television, that was it. Right?

James Tubbs 15:34

What would Mr. Greenjeans and Clarabelle say about that?

Dave Chow 15:37

Well, that was Mr. Greenjeans back in the day?

James Tubbs 15:39

Mr. Greenjeans. (The professors laugh)

Matt Mio 15:41

Oh my gosh, I think I showed my kids a clip where they would try to get him to say the word and then ping pong balls would fall on his head. And they're like, "What the heck is this?" I was like, "You watch things way worse than this. That's all I can say."

Mara Livezey 16:27

Matt Mio 16:28

Yeah.

Dave Chow 16:30

Stevens? Plural?

Matt Mio 16:30

Stevens was his first name. Mason. I feel like if I give the middle initial, it might give it away.

Dave Chow 16:37

He didn't invent a jar, did he?

Matt Mio 16:40

Mara already landed very quickly on the fact that this person was a very young person when they passed. They were also a very young person when they got into politics. Very young.

Dave Chow 16:50

Oh, I was gonna say he' was, like, a model for like, Ivory Soap or something like that.

Mara Livezey 16:54

I mean, famous for being the youngest, like Governor or something?

Matt Mio 16:57

That's exactly correct.

Dave Chow 16:58

Oh!

Matt Mio 16:58

the first and youngest governor of the great state of Michigan.

Mara Livezey 17:01

Oh, Michigan!

Matt Mio 17:02

That's exactly right. For the record, he was appointed governor at age 24.

James Tubbs 17:09

Wow.

Mara Livezey 17:09

Oh, no.

Matt Mio 17:10

Yes. "The Boy Governor" as he was known.

Bob Rogowski 17:12

I think he's buried - they recently moved his -

Matt Mio 17:15

Oh, really?

Bob Rogowski 17:16

Yeah, it's in. Oh, I'm trying to think of the little area there. Can't remember what the little area is called, but they recently moved him.

Matt Mio 17:24

But like, is it downtown?

Bob Rogowski 17:26

Yeah, it's downtown.

Matt Mio 17:27

Yeah, exactly. So yeah -

Bob Rogowski 17:29

Right off Washington Boulevard.

Matt Mio 17:30

I just remember my wife bringing it up that it's just sort of like the bench has got to be really shallow. When we would scoff at 24 year old getting elected to Congress these days. You know what i mean. "Oh, We're just gonna put you in charge of the whole territory". I'm like "Okay". And then he croked a few years later too.

Dave Chow 17:47

Mara Livezey 18:13

Oh.

Matt Mio 18:14

And I can't believe we're saying this, but Comerica Park is already 23 years old. It's kinda fascinating when you say things like that. I remember old Tiger Stadium too.

Dave Chow 18:24

Yep.

Matt Mio 18:25

How about Roy Thorton. Born 1908, passed 1937. Another short lifetime. American outlaw.

Dave Chow 18:36

Doc Holliday or somebody like that?

Matt Mio 18:38

Roy Thorton

Dave Chow 18:40

Wait a minute. Did he go by another name?

Matt Mio 18:43

That's not what it says here. But he is associated by somebody with a name not even close to his.

Dave Chow 18:48

Like a Bonnie and Clyde kind of thing?

Matt Mio 18:51

Yeah. That's exactly - He was Bonnie Parker's husband.

Dave Chow 18:54

Oh!

Matt Mio 18:54

Yeah. He died in an attempted prison escape. Yes, he actually married her in 1926. And they never divorced. So there's a short lifespan for you there. Roy Thornton. Everybody thinks Bonnie and Clyde go together; and they do but not in that way.

Dave Chow 19:10

Like peanut butter and jelly.

Matt Mio 19:11

Yeah, exactly. Okay. Chi Loon, according to history died in 121 ad. Okay, so put your time travel hats. Okay. Inventor/Chinese court official.

Dave Chow 19:24

Paper?

Mara Livezey 19:25

Famous for the invention, I'm assuming

Matt Mio 19:27
