Beth Oljar 14:14 Okay.

Dan Maggio 14:15 West Coast

Beth Oljar 14:16

And it's not San Francisco

Kathy Bush 14:17 It's not San Fran. No.

Beth Oljar 14:19 Not Seattle

Kathy Bush 14:20

Not Seattle, but you're getting close.

Roy Finkenbine 14:23 Portland

Kathy Bush 14:24

Yes it is Portland, Oregon. So I was gonna ask you B what's up with that?

Beth Oljar 14:29

Portland is the city of carousels?

Kathy Bush 14:30

That's what it says - City of Carousels, and this is carousels as in you know - (Kathy does her

impression of the music of a carnival) "Doo-doo, doodle-doodle"

Beth Oljar 14:37

Well there - wow. I mean, there used to be one out at Jantzen Beach Mall, which I don't think

even exists anymore. I mean, Portland always been the city of roses to me.
